Closure of the Green Line D Branch Begins September 24th for Infrastructure Upgrades

Starting Saturday, September 24th, the Green Line D Branch will close for three nine-day, full-access closures. The closures will take place on a rolling basis through Sunday, October 30th. During this closure, the MBTA will replace track, station crossings, and install way-side equipment for the Green Line Train Protection System (GLTPS).

Track replacement, station crossing work, and GLTPS wayside equipment installation work will take place on the Green Line D Branch during three nine-day periods from September 24th through October 30th.

"These kinds of full-access diversions allow the T to accelerate investments and improvements across the system," said MBTA General Manager Steve Poftak. "With three full-access diversions already successfully completed on the Green Line this summer, I am confident the Capital Transformation team will complete the D Branch promptly and on schedule, delivering an increased level of safety and reliability to our riders through track replacement work and the installation of GLTPS infrastructure. I want to thank our Green Line riders for their patience while we accomplish this critical work on a faster timeline."

The Green Line Transformation team already completed three Green Line diversions this summer on the B, C, and E Branches, and the D Branch diversion is the final diversion in this project. The D Branch improvements require some



prep work, which will began Monday, September 19th, and ended Friday, September 23rd. Prep work will not interfere with regularly scheduled service.

In order to cause less disruption to Green Line riders, this 27-day, full-access closure will be broken into three nine-day periods:

- Saturday, September 24th
- Sunday, October 2nd
 Saturday, October 8th
- Sunday, October 16th
 Saturday, October 22nd
- Saturday, October 22nd Sunday, October 30th

"The Capital Transformation team continues to work diligently to deliver the best service possible for our riders," said MBTA Chief of Capital Transformation Angel Peña. "Although this is the last scheduled surge for the Green Line this year, our team is always looking for ways to best serve our riders and deliver the safest and most reliable commute possible. Thank you to all of our Green Line riders this summer for your patience and understanding as we made these much-needed improvements across the line."

During this closure, the MBTA will replace over 6,000 feet of track, upgrade over six station crossings, and

install wayside equipment for GLTPS. A majority of the full-depth track replacement will take place between Eliot and Riverside stations. During the full-access closures, the parking lots at Waban and Eliot stations will be closed to the public due to track material and vehicle storage.

Alternative service will be available for all D Branch riders throughout the closures. Free, accessible shuttle buses will stop at stations between Riverside and Kenmore. Shuttle buses will not stop at Beaconsfield station due to narrow roads in the area. Riders can use Reservoir station, or Dean Road on the C Branch in order to access the Green Line.

Free, accessible shuttle bus service will be available for all D Branch passengers.

Renewing Motor Vehicle Inspection Stickers

Starting November 1st, vehicles passing inspection will get a new sticker with the month the last sticker expired, valid for one year starting October 1st; vehicle owners will no longer receive a printed inspection report when a vehicle passes inspection.

The Massachusetts Registry of Motor Vehicles (RMV) is announcing, effective November 1, 2022, motor vehicles passing required inspections will get a new sticker with the month the last sticker expired, valid for one year. Any vehicle owner late in getting a vehicle inspected, beyond one year from the last inspection, will no longer get a sticker displaying the month the new inspection occurred.

Vehicles with inspection stickers that expired last year will receive a January sticker of the current year the vehicle is being inspected, no matter the month the vehicle is inspected this year. This change does not impact the requirements for newly purchased vehicles. All newly purchased vehicles must be inspected within seven days of the vehicle registration date and will receive a sticker of the month in which it was inspected and is valid for one year.

"Safety of the Commonwealth's roadways is the most important reason for motor vehicle inspections. Vehicle inspections check tire treads, ensure all light signals are working and even check the front ball joints. It is the law that motor vehicles are inspected every year," said Registrar of Motor Vehicles Colleen Ogilvie. "Vehicle owners are required to have the inspection done one year from the month the last inspection was done. We are asking all vehicle owners to place safety

first and make sure to check your inspection date, and don't be late."

"Light-duty cars and trucks are equipped with emission control systems that reduce pollution to protect public health and the environment. It is important that these systems are tested annually to ensure proper emissions controls," said Commissioner Martin Suuberg of the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (MassDEP). "The change being implemented by the RMV will help ensure that all vehicles are inspected every year."


The penalty for driving vehicles with an expired sticker, or driving an uninspected vehicle, may result in a moving violation and lead to additional fines, or

CALIGULA THE GONER



After actually going broke, Caligula devised complicated and cunning schemes for his income. The wills of centurions (military commanders) that did not name the emperor among their heirs were set aside on the grounds of ingratitude. Then to go a little farther, those persons that did name the emperor as heir and continued to live were accused of making a game of such declaration and they were sent poisoned "pasticceria." He personally auctioned off all of the equipment left over from theatrical performances and ran the bids up so high that some who were forced to buy the articles chose to commit suicide. In one humorous incident, Aponius Saturninus fell asleep during an auction, providing the characteristic nod that sleepers often do. The bidding was not stopped until 13 gladiators were his new possessions at a cost of nine million sesterces.

He levied new and unheard of taxes. There was no class of commodities or men, which he did not impose some form of tariff. These included food, lawsuits, and daily wages. He even taxed the daily earnings of prostitutes in the amount of one encounter. The earnings of panderers or procurers were also included at the same rate. As a "piece de resistance," even the holy state of matrimony was not exempt.

After the birth of his daughter, he took up collections for the girl's maintenance and dowry. On the kalends of January (first day), he stood in the palace entrance to accept the money that the people showered upon him. It was said that he loved to walk barefooted or wallow in piles of gold coins while naked.

Caligula's hair was very thin and he was bald on top, consequently it was considered a capital offense to gaze upon him from above. In time, his face became ugly enough, but he even made it more savage looking by practicing fearsome expressions before a mirror. As a boy, he had epilepsy and there were times in his adult life when he could not walk, stand, or collect his thoughts. While emperor, he was tormented with insomnia; he never rested for more than three hours each night, and these were full of nightmares and strange visions. During thunderstorms, this great leader would hide

under the bed. While journeying through Sicily, he fled by night in panic because of some smoke and roaring from Mt. Etna. He also had strange habits of dress, and often appeared in public wearing embroidered clothing covered with precious stones while wearing bracelets. Sometimes he would wear fine silks, a woman's robe, and lowstyle female shoes.

He frequently wore the dress of triumphant generals even before a campaign, and somehad removed from the stone literary talents and performed singing, but he never learned

suspension if unpaid, and even a surchargeable incident which increases the vehicle owner's insurance costs.

There is no change for owners who get their vehicles inspected on time or before the due date. Owners will continue to receive the sticker with the number of the month in which the vehicle was inspected.

In addition, starting October 1, 2022, in an effort to reduce paper waste in the environment, vehicle owners will no longer receive a printed inspection report when a vehicle passes inspection. Instead, owners can easily access and print a report by going online to: Mass Vehicle Check or by using a cell phone and scanning the QR code on the poster displayed at the inspection site. If a vehicle fails the inspection, the owner will be provided with a printed vehicle inspection report by the inspection station. The Massachusetts Vehicle

Check, a joint effort between the MassDEP and the RMV, is the vehicle emissions testing and safety inspection program for the Commonwealth. Vehicle owners can get an inspection at any of the 1,800 licensed inspection stations in Massachusetts.

Saint Andrew Kim Taegon

Andrew Kim Taegon was born to Korean nobility, and his parents converted when he was 15-years

Andrew Kim Taegon was born in Solmou, Dangjin, Korea, August 21, 1821. Kim was the first Koreanborn Catholic priest and is the patron saint of Korean clergy. His father was martyred for practicing His Faith, a prohibited activity in heavily Confucian Korea.

After being baptized at age 15, Kim studied at a seminary in the Portuguese colony of Macau. He also spent time in study at Lolomboy, Bocaue, Bulacan, Philippines, where today he is venerated. In 1844 after nine years of study, Kim was ordained a priest in Shanghai by the French bishop Jean Joseph Jean-Baptiste Ferréol. Kim then returned to Korea to preach and evangelize.

During the Joseon Dynasty, Christianity was



suppressed and many Christians were persecuted and executed. Catholics had to practice their faith covertly. Kim was one of several thousand Christians who were executed during this time. In 1846, at the age of 25, he was tortured and beheaded near Seoul on the Han River.

Before Ferréol, the first bishop of Korea, died from exhaustion on February 3, 1853, he wanted to be buried beside Kim, stating, "You

will never know how sad I was to lose this young native priest. I have loved him as a father loved his son; it is a consolation for me to think of his eternal happiness."

On May 6 1984, Pope John Paul II canonized Kim along with 102 other Korean Martyrs, during his trip to Korea. The feast day of Andrew Kim Taegon, Paul Chong Hasang and companions is celebrated on September 20th.

L'Anno Bello: A Year in Italian Folklore

Falling for the Fruits of Fall

It is no secret that I love to bake. The bookshelf adjacent to my kitchen brims with dog-eared cookbooks whose chocolate-stained, worn pages tell the stories of delicious treats past. I especially enjoy baking when the calendar turns to the months of autumn, when chilly dark nights propel me into the warmth of a cozy kitchen. Fall is also an optimal time for baking because of the abun-

dance of fruits and vegetables harvested around this time of year. As surely as the colorful leaves swirl gracefully in the September wind, I know that crisp apples, juicy pears and creamy pumpkins will form an essential part of my fall baking repertoire. However, baking is not the only way to enjoy the generosity of Earth's harvest. Autumnal produce makes a wonderful addition to salads, pastas and drinks, and of course nothing can quite compare to a fresh, seasonal fruit eaten in its plain natural state. One can develop an even deeper appreciation of fall's bounty when one examines the manner in which these fruits have shaped not only culinary creations but the very culture and traditions of societies around the world. So as the autumn unravels around us in all its rustic and comforting glory, let us take a look at the folklore, superstitions, and recipes of four of our favorite seasonal treats.

Apples: Apples are synonymous with the fall for me. They conjure memories of collecting bags of bright jewel-toned fruit at a sunny apple orchard, of the tingle of tart apple cider dancing on my tongue, and of fresh-baked breads and streusel-topped crisps cooling on the kitchen counter. I have a difficult time thinking of an apple recipe I did not enjoy, and apples eaten straight from the trees are equally delicious with their burst of juicy, bittersweet pulp. As one of the quintessential fruits of the season, with a fairly long harvesting period, apples also figure heavily in European myths and legends. The Greek demigod Heracles (or Hercules to the Romans) had to obtain golden apples as one of his arduous twelve labors, and the Celtic King Arthur recovered from his wounds in a mythical land called Avalon, or "isle of apples." Apples symbolized wisdom and immortality to the ancient Norse, while in the Germanic fairy tale Snow White, an apple causes the titular princess to fall into an enchanted slumber from which only a true love's kiss could save her. Popular tradition equates the apple with the fruit of the Tree of Knowledge in the Garden of Eden, though it was never actually identified as such in the Bible. Apples also formed the crux of many Halloween divination rituals, as unmarried girls would interpret the shape of an apple peel or eat an apple in front of a candlelit mirror to reveal her future spouse on this spooky night. In Italy, apples are known as mele and are often baked into tarts or dumplings. Northern



Italians are particularly fond of making German-inspired apple *strudels*.

Pumpkins: Ah, the pumpkin!

This rotund, sunny fruit — and yes, pumpkin is a fruit! — carries the connotation of cozy, communal festivities. After all, pumpkins are one of the most recognizable symbols of Halloween worldwide, and pumpkin pie has become a mainstay at autumnal harvest celebrations like Thanksgiving. Autumn means pumpkin to me, and whether I am making pumpkin-chocolate chip bread, pumpkin butter cake, or pumpkin scones, the aroma of this fall favorite wafts through my kitchen on the darkened evenings of the season. Like apples, pumpkins also hold an important cultural history. Native Americans used pumpkins, including pumpkin seeds, for culinary and medicinal purposes long before the Europeans arrived on the continent. After pumpkins were introduced to Europe, the orange fruit found its way into several familiar fairy tales and tidbits of lore. In the French folktale Cinderella, a fairy godmother turns a pumpkin into a horse-drawn carriage, which then takes Cinderella to a much-anticipated royal ball. Strange superstitions became attached to pumpkins, including the fruit's alleged ability to cure snakebites and banish freckles! Nowadays, pumpkins are instantly recognizable as carved and illuminated jack-olanterns at Halloween, a holdover from an old Irish custom of hollowing out turnips and placing a candle in them in order to frighten the evil spirits perambulating the world on this night. Italians love to cook with pumpkin — known as zucca in Italy — in savory dishes, such as pumpkin ravioli and pumpkin gnocchi, often accompanied by buttery sauces with sage.

Pears: My mother loves pears, and eagerly awaits the arrival of these green-yellow fruits at the supermarket every autumn. Pears drizzled with caramel sauce or yogurt are simply sublime, as the sweetness of the topping brings out the subtle, slightly nutty taste of the fruit. I like to bake pears in cakes or breads, and they taste especially good when mixed with tart apples in a pie or crisp. Pears do not occupy as big of a space in folklore as some other fruits, but nevertheless several fascinating bits of folklore abound. In China, it is bad luck to split and share a pear with a close friend or loved one. That is because the Chinese term for "sharing a pear" sounds like the word for "separate,"

and thus holds an ominous connotation. In Europe, it was bad luck for a pear tree to bloom out of season, and such an unusual event portended calamitous consequences. Italians know pears as pere and use them in many inventive dishes. Pears can form the main component of tarts or cakes, or can be enjoyed in savory dishes like salads. Italians like to serve pears poached

in wine or drizzled with balsamic syrup for a simple yet decadent finale to an autumnal meal.

Chestnuts: Finally, I am compelled to add chestnuts to this list because of nostalgic purposes. Every fall, my father would bring home a bag filled with chestnuts, gleaming like polished wood, straight from the supermarket or, even better, a small Italian grocery store. He would then cut an opening at the top of each chestnut to release the stream and roast them in the oven. The warmth of the oven and the creamy aroma of the roasting chestnuts enveloped the whole house like a bear hug, and to this day chestnuts remind me of cloudy, drizzly fall days spent in the joyful company of friends and family. Superstition dictates that carrying a chestnut protects a person from a whole bevvy of ills, and I am pleased that this veritable little nut has such a positive association in folklore. Italians harvest chestnuts, or castagne, every fall, dropping them from the trees like a cascade of glossy marbles. The chestnuts may then be enjoyed roasted, as my father liked, their pulp soft and pillowy. They may also be ground into flour to make cakes or pie crusts. No matter how they are cooked, chestnuts remain one of Italy's best fall flavors.

The fruits and produce of autumn teem with the very sensations of the season. They are reminders of communal gatherings that honor the bounty of the Earth, of the rhythmic dance of the harvest, of family recipes that have withstood the flow of time and inspired each future generation. By exploring the folklore surrounding some of these fruits, we are recognizing the importance of agriculture and sustenance for our ancestors. By delighting in their tastes, we have become part of living history, participating in the joys of each passing season. So go ahead and enjoy your apples, pumpkins, pears and chestnuts, and remember that these delicious treats belong to the tapestry of human culture and storytelling and holidays. Share them with others, especially those who have trouble putting food on the table. Let us carry the pleasures of autumn and the harvest wherever we go, and delight in the blessings of the season that surrounds

Campaign Underway to Repeal New Law Allowing Driver's Licenses for Undocumented/Illegal Immigrants

A new law (H-4805) that would allow undocumented/illegal immigrants is scheduled to start July 1, 2023, which will give them the right to apply for a Massachusetts driver's license will be headed to the ballot on Election Day, November 8th so voters (not Beacon Hill) can decide whether to repeal it or keep it.

The campaign to repeal the new law was steered by Maureen Maloney whose son Matt Denice was killed by a drunk driver who did not have legal status in this country and illegally drove a motor vehicle. During the period that the petition drive was on, voters lined up in droves to sign the repeal voicing their opposition to the new law not even yet in effect.

Opponents of the repeal campaign reportedly harassed and tried to prevent voters from signing the petition and in some cases forced local police to shut down volunteers from collecting more signatures. The other side obviously likes the new law that is coming if voters don't stop it on Election Day. One supporter of the new law, Elizabeth Sweet says, "The (law) keeps people safer by ensuring that all drivers, regardless of immigration status, know and follow the rules of the road, take the same driver's test and have insurance when they need it." I'm still trying to figure out what she means by "have insurance when they need it." Isn't the answer, all motor vehicles on the road need to be insured?

I believe it is up to WE THE PEOPLE OF MASSACHUSETTS to decide if this new law is right for us. I do believe this new law could open the door

to non-citizens voting. That is a real concern considering just how badly the RMV has performed of late, right?

I trust voters will make the correct call in November. While the other side says "We are disappointed that this unnecessary and divisive repeal question appears to be moving forward, we are more than determined than ever to defend the expansion of permission to apply for a driver's license."

This ballot question is crystal clear who should or shouldn't be able to apply for a Massachusetts driver's license. Driving a motor vehicle in Massachusetts is not a right, but a privilege. I didn't say this, the Registry of Motor Vehicles states this. I am tired of those sob stories about illegal immigrants afraid to take their children to the doctor's office for fear of getting caught by the police. One final question few want to answer. Does this law, if enacted, mean that there will no longer be unregistered or uninsured cars on the road. I was born at night, but not last night.

As the grandson of immigrants to this country, I am not anti-immigrant, never have been! I am all for helping those who come here legally like my grandparents and the grandparents of many who are reading my words right here.

We will need to find a way to fix our immigration policy because the status quo isn't working out too well. However, driver's licenses are not yet a top priority for most of us.

Vote NO on driver's licenses for illegal immigrants this November 8th!

A Nostalgic Remembrance

Back in the day during the summer, there was no such animal as air conditioning. We lived in house that had wooden screens that were coated with DDT to keep out the mosquitoes. Maybe, just maybe, one of the screens had an electric fan in it to keep us cool, but that was it. Nanna used the cellar kitchen to cook in and we, more often than not, ate in the back yard.

The table and chairs in the back yard had started out in the upstairs kitchen a generation earlier. When it got old, it became the kitchen set for the kitchen in the cellar, and the cellar kitchen set went out to the back yard. Whatever set that had been part of the back yard décor, was sold to a junk man who would come to the house from Chelsea, pick it up with his horse and wagon, and then ride through the neighborhood yelling out, "Any old rags," with something else added on that no one could understand. Things didn't go to waste. Even the dished and silverware used for the summer dinners were those that had seen a better day. You might ask, "Why didn't they use paper dishes and plastic utensils?" Well, they cost money. Both Nanna and Babbononno coming from modest means knew how to cut corners. Bringing up their children during the Depression of the '30s gave the next generation a sampling of how to cut corners, too.

The one thing my family wasn't frugal on was food. They bought the best. But, back in the old neighborhood, there were no supermarkets. More often than not, there were corner stores with some specializing in the products or produce they sold. Today we shop in supermarkets and to examine a piece of meat or chicken, you have to look through a clear cellophane wrap to the contents lying in a Styrofoam dish.

During World War II, everything was rationed, and like all families, we had ration books with stamps inside that determined how much of something you could buy. With several of us living as separate families under the same roof, things were a bit easier. Even Dad and my uncles had rationing to deal with where their cars were concerned. First of all, a few months after the war started, all auto manufacturers stopped making transportation for the civilian market. They all switched to war production. This meant that after the first few months of 1942, there were no new cars made. If you wanted to buy a car, it had to be a used one. You couldn't buy new tires. They too were only manufactured for military vehicles. If you needed tires, you bought recaps, retreads or just used tires. And, gasoline was rationed for all private vehicles.

People who owned vehicles were issued stickers that were to be displayed in the right front corner of their car's windshield. The most common sticker had a black capital A right in the center. This entitled the owner

to three gallons of gas per week. People who had to drive for a living which included the musicians in my family had stickers with capital B in the middle. This group of people was entitled to five gallons of gas per week. During the war, Dad taught at East Boston High School during the day and walked the two blocks from where we lived to where the school was located. My uncles used public transportation, the Boston Elevated, today's MBTA. At night, they usually played with bands that worked the downtown Boston hotels, restaurants, or nightclubs. Things weren't too bad as a result. At the beginning of the war, Dad played with a quintet at the Fife and Drum room of the Hotel Vendome on Commonwealth Ave. When he left that band, he joined a Latin American band that played on the roof level nightclub of the Bradford Hotel on Tremont Street. The distances weren't that great and the Sumner Tunnel was only fifteen cents each way. Come the weekend, Dad always had a little gas left over to take Mom and me for a short ride.

As I said, everything was rationed and you shopped at specialty stores. On a given day, Nanna, Mom, and I would head to the corner of Eutaw and Meridian Streets and take the trolley to Maverick Square where a Kosher slaughter house was located. Nanna and Mom would pick out the chickens they wanted (live chickens) and have them killed, prepared, and then bagged. Nanna would put them in her black oil cloth shopping bag and we would head to Jefferies Point and one of the bakeries that existed. Nanna would buy Babbononno the round loaf of bread which is the only type he would eat. Mom would buy a sliced Scali loaf wrapped in white wax paper. From there it was a long walk to Bennington Street where Kennedy's Butter and Egg store was located. Once the purchases were made and the stamps given to the salesperson, we would walk to Brooks Street and start up the hill to where we lived. The John Sava grocery store was on the corner of Bennington and Brooks. Any canned goods that were needed could be bought there, and again the correct amount of stamps turned in. The next stop was Faber's Fish Market, where the catch of the day was displayed in the showcases surrounded by cracked ice.

As we continued up the Brooks Street hill, there was a butcher shop on the corner of Brooks and Princeton. Everyone called the place Brooks Brothers. A father and three sons owned the business and Nanna would buy her meats freshly cut in front of her. Again, ration stamps were given. The walk up the hill next included a stop at a green grocer on the corner of Brooks and Trenton Streets. Mr. Bruno, an old timer would sell the ladies in my family the fruits and vegetables they needed for the next couple of days. He would always slip me a peach when no one was looking and Mom would give me a penny for a hand full of dried chi chis that were houses in a silver colored machine that was an antique and falling apart, but still worked.

There would be one more stop at a store on the corner of Eutaw and Brooks, Cutliff's Variety, which later became Staffier's Grocery. Before the Staffier brothers bought the place from old man Cutliff, the store was stocked with the needs for the Americans in the neighborhood. When it became Italian after the Staffier brothers took over, Nanna and Mom could buy Italian cold cuts and cheeses, plus anything else they forgot to get on their journey. There was always someone on the corner who Nanna would speak to and give a nickel to. He was the local investment broker (bookie) whom Nanna and many others would visit to play the number for the day. The payback for a lottery number win was about seven dollars a cent and Nanna always had a number to play. She actually hit a few times. No one ever told her that this man was a bookie and playing the number was illegal. Once we were back in the house, all the purchases of the day were put away and Nanna and my mother would do some accounting to see what they spent and how many stamps were used and what was left

This is the way we lived through World War II. The best part of the story is that everyone in the family that was in uniform came home alive.

Fall is in the air and apple desserts will soon be popping up everywhere! I can't think of a better time than this to indulge in a slice of one of Northern Italy's most popular apple desserts, Strudel di Mele. Apple Strudel, as it's known in this country, happens to be Trentino's signature dessert. Traditionally this delicacy was made with a paper-thin puff or short crust pastry filled with apples, pine nuts and raisins. Strudel is so prominent in this region that it is celebrated at a yearly "Strudel Week" festival in the town of Castelrotto in late August to early September. This festival features exhibitions in the art of making strudels, as well as an array of delicious sweet and savory strudels to sample!

My Nonna had apple trees, so you can just imagine the variety of scrumptious apple treats she created. When she made a strudel, she never used a recipe for the filling. It was a mixture of sliced apples, raisins, and spices. Typically, she'd use her signature sweet dough, and sometimes she'd even use a sour cream or puff pastry version. I loved her short crust dough and when I tried the sour cream version, though I found it to be different, it was equally delightful. My Nonna's Italian Apple Strudel or Strudel di Mele is easy to make and scrumptious to eat. Be prepared because as it bakes in the oven, your kitchen is going to be filled with the most amazing cinnamon sugared apple aroma you will ever experience. Strudel di Mele makes the perfect Fall dessert, particularly when served warm with a scoop of vanilla gelato!

ITALIAN APPLE STRUDEL Strudel di Mele



Dough:

 $2 \frac{1}{4}$ cups all-purpose flour 10 tablespoons cold butter, cut into cubes

3 tablespoons sugar

½ package Paneangeli Lievito or 1 teaspoons baking powder

½ teaspoon salt

1 eaa, liahtlu beaten

3/4 cup sour cream

Apple Filling:

6 cups (about 7 to 8) apples, peeled and cut into slices or

1 ½ tablespoons butter

½ cup sugar

1/4 cup sliced pine nuts, almonds, walnuts or raisins Pinch of cinnamon, optional

Preheat the oven to 375°. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper and set aside.

In a large skillet, melt the 1½ tablespoons of butter, add the apples and 1/4 cup of sugar and cook over medium low heat for about 8 minutes, do not let them get too soft. Remove from heat and add in pine nuts, almonds, walnuts or raisins, set

In a large mixing bowl, add the flour and butter, cut together using a pastry cutter until the mixture is soft and grainy. Add the sugar, baking powder and salt, mix well. Blend in the beaten egg and sour cream and knead well. Let dough sit for 15 to 20 minutes.

Place the dough on a generously floured dough board and cut in half. Roll each half, adding more flour if needed (only a tablespoon at a time), into a workable 12 by 14-inch rectangle. Spread ½ of the cooled apple filling in a line down the middle of each piece of dough and roll the dough up, making sure all edges are tucked and sealed around the filling. Gently place strudels seam sides down on the prepared baking sheet. Pierce a few holes through the top layers of the dough and bake for 35 minutes, (depending on oven and size of strudels) until golden brown. Let cool and sprinkle generously with confectioner's sugar. Slice and enjoy, refrigerate leftovers.

Alcatraz

Everyone should visit Alcatraz if only to erase every romanticism surrounding it created by Hollywood. It wasn't just a gritty cold penitentiary. It was a deadly, unsanitary and dirty building of tiny cages not fit for a zoo animal. It has gotten worse since it shut its doors in 1963. The water saturation corroding the structure which was a factor leading to its closure has continued its path of destruction and many of the buildings which were burned during the American Indian Movement's Occupation of 1969-71 (notably the warden's house) have been left in ruin and graffiti from the occupation is still visible at entry. Sea bird defecation is inescapable throughout the island.

It is not easy to muster much sympathy for a man of the prison's most notorious inmates. Al Capone, Machine Gun Kelly, and even Robert Stroud, the famous birdman, all had multiple murders in their records. Hollywood has at least been honest about the brutality of many of these thugs, though The Birdman of Alcatraz painted altogether too snuggly a picture of Stroud. In a curious twist, however, Murder in the First starring Christian Slater and Kevin Bacon, based on the 1941 trial of inmate Henri Young which first put the treatment of inmates in Alcatraz under scrutiny was, naturally given its aim, candid about the inhuman routines of the prison, but painted such a gross lie of the real Henri Young that it cancels out any revelation it could have brought.

Decay has certainly crept into the cells but it's not what shocks at first. The size of those cells, which never were a paradigm of humanity, even by prison standards, is the real horror. Even the library, which prisoners could gain access to after proven good conduct, was a pitiful metal enclosure with small wooden bookcases. The courtvard was but little bigger than a greenhouse and the showers lost their privacy partitions in the '50s to discourage violence. Some lucky inmates who got in good with the guards would be privileged with slightly more spacious cells, but the standard cell was such a sensual, mental and emotive nightmare that it makes but little difference that an even more frightful sight existed at the end of D-Block (the block reserved for the most violent of brutes) known as "The Hole."



Perhaps it was a necessity for those who ran the place to operate as they did or perhaps it was the point of Alcatraz, but dehumanization of criminals was part of the process. As inmate Jim Quillen stated, "You were a number, you weren't a name; I wasn't Jim Quillen. Hell, I was Number 586 and nobody wanted that." That was what was needed to be believed about humans being crammed into rat cages.

Alcatraz has been under the care of the National Park Service since 1976. Little has been done to polish the derelict structure. It is the way it should be. Alcatraz was a hellhole and that is how it should be remembered.



ers you are mistaken. Many


fighters smoked, and some,

HOOPS and HOCKEY in the HUB

CHARA CONCLUDES A CLASSIC CAREER — It was in the corner where one could usually find him inside the Bruins locker room after a game.

There in front of his assigned space, where he hung his skates and pads plus the assorted other items that hockey players use, was where Zdeno Chara chose to address the members of the media.

As team captain, he could have had a placement closer to the center of the room but he seemed to like the corner. In retrospect, it did seem to serve as a sort of funnel, allowing those media members who arrived promptly first hand access to the on-ice leader of the team. Be among the first to arrive and one would have the big man looking right down at you. Show up later and one might be banished to a fourth or fifth row, straining for a view and auditory cues.

The latter was not a punishment devised by the tallest active player in the National Hockey League (6-9). It was simply the reality of a postgame situation that would develop on many a night when the Bruins locker room was opened to media about 10 minutes following the conclusion of a home game.

The only aspect that was last about the Big Man of the Bruins (6-9) was his nickname — Z — the final letter of the Roman alphabet. Everything else was first class and superior. At times, when viewed up close, one could picture him with a large ball in his hands, walking down the hallway to another locker room that was the domain of the Boston Celtics. In some ways, the sports are similar. In hockey, players often battle against the boards. In basketball, players compete for ball possession under them.

Over the course of his 24 seasons in the National Hockey League — 14 of them with the Bruins--he set the record for durability as a defenseman. He retired on September 20th as the record holder for most games played by a defenseman. He passed Chris Chelios in February to claim the top spot and retired having played 1,680 games in the back end. He also saw action in 200 Stanley Cup Playoff games.

Along the way, he also amassed 680 career points with 209 goals and 471 assists. He also led the Bruins to three Stanley Cup Final appearances. It was in 2011 that the B's captured the Cup in a Game Seven victory in Vancouver, ending a span that saw 39 years elapse without a title.

For all his success that his athletic talents brought him, both in terms of fame and finances, Chara never lost a number of "every man" qualities. In the aftermath of the 2011 Cup victory, he came over to the Garden one day on his bicycle, a vivid departure from those in other sports who probably would have made a similar trip to their home team facility by driving a luxury car.

Following their title season, the B's contended for the Cup once again in 2013, losing to Chicago in a Game Six finale at the Garden. They would wait six more years to make another deep run for the Cup. When that time arrived in 2019, it proved to be perhaps Zdeno Chara's finest hour.

The 2018-2019 season was memorable for a number of reasons. First Tampa Bay ran away with the regular season title, amassing 128 points to capture the Presidents' Trophy.

The Lightning were then eliminated in the first round of the playoffs, swept 4-0 by Columbus. The team that accumulated the most points over the course of the regular season failed to win a single playoff game. Bruins radio broadcaster Bob Beers said that cleared the way for the Bruins since Tampa would have been the B's second round opponent if they had prevailed over Columbus.

Another stunning development involved St. Louis, a team that literally was in last place in the (then) entire 31-team league on New Year's Day 2019. The Blues wound up winning the Cup in June.

Chara's heroics were fully on display in that Stanley Cup Final against St. Louis. Struck in the face by a shot in Game Four, he suffered a broken jaw but returned for Game Five following extensive medical treatment. Teammate Brad Marchand's comment — "He's a warrior" — was appropriate as Chara took the ice to a thunderous applause from the Garden crowd.

Although the Bruins would lose the Stanley Cup Final to St. Louis in seven games, his decision to play demonstrated to all his commitment to his teammates and the franchise.

Covid-19 came some nine months later and things were never the same. Just prior to the start of what amounted to the 2021 season — an abbreviated 56-game, four-month campaign — Chara was not given a contract by Boston. We always viewed this as a low point. After all Chara had done for the organization, the team would not sign him up again for a minimum of four additional months.


He wound up playing for Washington during that short season, then moved to the Islanders last year for what turned out to be his final campaign.

And just like Red Sox star Ted Williams, he went out on a high note. Williams hit a home run in his final Major League at bat in 1960. Chara scored a goal in what became the final minute of his NHL career last April 29 when he found the range for a tally with 44 seconds remaining in a 6-4 loss to Tampa Bay on Long Island. Fans responded by chanting his name while members of the Lightning shook his hand.

In his final season, he was the oldest active roster player in the five major sports organizations in North America (NHL, NBA, MLB, NFL, MLS).

By signing a one-day contract with Boston on September 20, it enabled him to retire as a Bruin, thus bringing his career to a satisfying conclusion. He will be remembered as an excellent team captain and outstanding champion.

The ancient Romans placed the letter Z last in their alphabet. But to many members of Bruins Nation, Z will always be first in their thoughts.
